

AIMS

Geography Policy 2024

At Christ the King, geography is a valued part of the curriculum. It provides a purposeful means for exploring, appreciating and understanding the world in which we live and how it has evolved. Geography explores the relationship between the Earth and its people through the study of place, space and environment. Geography is concerned with pupils learning about their own locality whilst developing knowledge and understanding of the world beyond their own environment. Geography encourages children to learn through experience, particularly through fieldwork activities. The strands in geography are: Decetional knowledge Human and physical geography Geographical skills and fieldwork

APPROACH In line with the National Curriculum, we take an enquiry-based approach in lessons, guided by 'key questions' and 'big concepts' and aims to:

- To inspire in pupils a curiosity about the world and its people that will remain with them for the rest of their lives.
- To provide pupils with knowledge about diverse places, people, resources and natural and human environments.

• To develop a growing knowledge about the world to deepen their understanding of the interaction between physical and human processes, and of the formation and use of landscapes and environments. Children will gain a growing appreciation of the impact of humans upon the Earth.

- To obtain Geographical knowledge, understanding and skills.
- To enable children to learn and explain how the Earth's features at different scales are shaped, interconnected and change over time.

RESOURCES	Teachers use geography resources that promote enquiry based learning and include: Connected Geography scheme and resources, progression documents, atlases, maps, plans and fieldwork guidance.
	Teachers also have access to the Geographical Association website, which provides resources and CPD opportunities.
	Both a world and UK map should be displayed and referred to regularly and, where possible, places should be located and labelled as they arise throughout all of the subject areas (but particularly history) to ensure children have an understanding of the location of historical events in relation to the wider world.
EYFS	In the Early Years Foundation Stage, geography is included as part of Understanding the World and children need to:
	 observe, find out about, and identify features in the place they live and the natural world; begin to know about their own cultures and beliefs and those of other people; find out about their environment, and talk about those features they like and dislike.
TIME	Geography is usually taught in half term blocks and alternated with history, although links are
ALLOCATION ASSESSMENT	explored as appropriate. In Y1- 1 hour per week; Y2-6 1. 5 hours per week. Geography work is marked in line with our 'Feedback and Marking Policy'.
	Formative assessment should take place during a lesson. The beginning of a lesson should start with a flashback to previous learning. Then, the focus will be on the key question being explored and reference to location of events on a world or UK map. Key questions should then be asked throughout the lesson to secure understanding of big concepts and a summary made at the end of each lesson.
	At the end of a geography topic, children are assessed in multiple ways. This could be via verbal questioning, short test paper or a longer piece of writing to show their acquired knowledge (KS2).
MONITORING AND REVIEW	This policy will be reviewed on a bi- annual basis by the subject leader.

The subject leader will monitor teaching and learning ensuring that the content of the national curriculum is covered across all phases of pupils' education. The subject leader will complete Pupil Voice questions termly to gain an insight into learning across the school.
The Curriculum committee of the governing body is briefed to oversee the teaching of geography, and meets termly with the subject leader to review progress.
Any changes made to this policy will be communicated to all teaching staff.
